"The Portland Festival celebrates its 44th year the first weekend in June (June 1st and 2nd). Colloquially known as, "The Portland Family Reunion" it brings current and former residents and neighbors from all over Kentucky and Indiana together along some of Portland's oldest tree-lined streets to celebrate the best of times and the worst of times of Portland's past, present, and future. From food vendors, art and craft booths, beer tents, information booths, carnival rides, and live music, there's something at The Festival for everyone. Held each year along Northwestern Parkway, starting near the Portland Library on 33rd Street, stretching to 36th Street, neighbors hang out on their porches and in their front yards to greet passers by. There's always a friend or two hundred in the crowd. Families crowd the photo booth to document their trip with a stamped photo button. Many families get them every year. Like school pictures, these 6 inch discs document the inevitable unfolding of children from adorable, drooling toddlers to snarky, pimpled teenagers. What happened to Dad's hair? They follow the smells to the most wonderful food ever invented: Fair Food. Anything deep fried and covered in sugar or cheese, instantly becomes delicious. With their bellies filled and their wallets emptied, there's no better time to hop on a few rides that spin and jerk and flip. Kids can't wait to brag to their friends back at school about the amusement park right in front of their house! Time to take a break to overcome the nausea and the dizziness at the Car Show around the corner, then chat with a few neighbors and friends on their way back to the main stage where Mom and Dad can grab a beer and rock and roll all night to some great live music. Inside the new restaurant Porkland BBQ

Welcome to Porkland BBQ

There is a new sit-down restaurant in the neighborhood. Love City Inc. opened Porkland BBQ on March 28 and the smell of fresh smoked BBQ is now wafting throughout Portland. Porkland specializes in slow smoked BBQ pork, chicken, and rib tips, but don't worry, Porkland hasn't forgotten its roots at the Love City Fish Fry. Fish is also on the menu every day now and not just on Fish Frydays. Porkland held its grand opening celebration on March 28 and welcomed many neighbors both near and far to come enjoy some Porkland and Portland hospitality. The menu is full of traditional BBQ favorites such as smoked pulled pork sandwich, smoked pulled chicken sandwich with sides smoked baked beans, potato salad and Cole slaw, but there are also some unique twists on BBQ as well. One specialty celebrates the neighborhood and got its name from a long time resident of Portland. 'Pops' Porkland Round Steak is a unique sandwich made of smoked bologna, on toasted white bread with a drizzle of nacho cheese, red and white BBQ sauces and Grippos™. The sandwich is the namesake of Rick Thomas long time Portland community member. "My kids didn't believe I had a sandwich named after me, so I had to bring them to try it" Rick said on opening night after eating his sandwich at Porkland.

And don't forget about the fish. All of the favorites from the Love City Fish Fry are still on the menu, fish sandwiches and rolled oysters and now available every day Porkland is open.

Porkland is open for dinner on Wednesday and Thursday from 4pm to 8pm and for lunch and dinner on Friday and Saturday from 11am to 8pm. Porkland is located at 2519 St Cecilia Street in Resurrection Hall.

Master Gunnery Sergeant Greg Allen Ashby

**Military Police Instruction Company
Marine Corps Detachment,
Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri**

Master Gunnery Sergeant Ashby was born in Louisville, Kentucky in 1975. In February of 1994 he enlisted in the Marine Corps and shipped to Paris Island, South Carolina. Upon graduation, he attended Marine Combat Training at Camp Lejeune, NC and subsequently attended Military Police School (5811) at Fort McClellan, AL.

In September of 1994, he checked into Marine Corps Air Station Futenma, Okinawa, Japan for duty as a Military Policeman. In November of the same year he was deployed to Manila, Philippines to provide security for the President of the United States (POTUS). While at MCAS Futenma he was promoted to the rank of Lance Corporal.

In September of 1995 he transferred to Marine Corps Logistic Base Albany, GA, as a Military Policeman. While at MCLB Albany Lance Corporal Ashby was selected to become a Military Working Dog (MWD) handler and attend MWD course at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, TX. After becoming a MWD Handler he provided MWD sweeps for POTUS and the Vice President of the United States. He was promoted to Corporal while attending MWD course and pinned on Sergeant one month prior to his rotation from MCLB Albany.

In March of 1998, he was transferred to MCB Camp Butler, Okinawa, Japan, for duty as a MWD Handler. During this tour Sergeant Ashby was elevated to the position of MWD trainer and was selected to attend the Kennel Master Course at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, TX.

In March of 2001, Sergeant Ashby transferred to H&S Bn, Quantico, VA where he served as the Kennel Master for the Provost Marshall's MWD Section. In 2002, Sergeant Ashby was promoted to the rank of Staff Sergeant. During this time Staff

Sergeant Ashby applied for selection to attend the SNCO Degree Completion Program (SNCODCP).

In June of 2003, Staff Sergeant Ashby was selected to attend the SNCODCP. He attended college at the University of Mary Washington in Fredericksburg, VA, and received a Bachelorette of Science in Psychology graduating with honors.

In December of 2004 Staff Sergeant Ashby reported to H&S BN, HQMC, Henderson Hall to fulfill his SNCODCP payback obligations serving as the SNCOIC of the Marine and Family Services. In Oct of 2006, he was promoted to the rank of Gunnery Sergeant. The same month Gunnery Sergeant Ashby deployed to Luzon, Philippines to assist with testing distributive operations.

In March of 2008, Gunnery Sergeant Ashby transferred to MCB Camp Butler, Okinawa, Japan, where he served as the Military Police District SNCOIC at Camp Courtney. After filling that billet for one year, he was moved up to the position of PMO training SNCOIC. In August of 2009 Gunnery Sergeant Ashby received permanent change of assignment orders to III MEF Headquarters Group (MHG), Camp Hanson, where he was put in charge of standing up the Military Police Support Company's first MWD section. During this time Gunnery Sergeant Ashby deployed to the Philippines and Thailand. In Zamboanga, Philippines he helped the Philippine Marines establish their first MWD section. In Pattaya, Thailand he trained Thai Marines in non-lethal weapons capabilities. During this tour Gunnery Sergeant Ashby also completed his Master's Degree in International Relations through Troy University.

In March of 2011 Gunnery Sergeant Ashby was transferred to Security and Emergency Services Battalion (SES BN), MCB Camp Pendleton, CA, where he served as a Platoon Sergeant. In April 2012, he was promoted to his current rank of Master Sergeant and moved to the BN to serve as the SES BN S-3 Operations Chief. In April 2013, he was reassigned as the Marine Corps Police Department Operations Chief.

In August of 2014 MSgt Ashby reported to the 1st Marine Logistics Group (1st MLG) as the Law Enforcement Integrations Officer and Antiterrorism Officer. In 2016 he attended the 263rd session of the FBI National Academy. On April 1st of 2016 he was frocked to his current rank, Master Gunnery Sergeant.

In May of 2016 Master Gunnery Sergeant Ashby reported to his present duty station, Marine Corps Detachment, Military Police School at Fort Leonard Wood, MO, where he currently serves as the MP School Academics Chief.

Master Gunnery Sergeant Ashby's personal awards include the Navy Marine Corps Commendation Medal with 3 gold stars in lieu of fourth award, Navy Marine Corps Achievement Medal with one gold star in lieu of second award, and the Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal.

Master Gunnery Sergeant Ashby has been married to the former Tomoko Maeshiro for 20 years and they have two kids, a daughter Jasmin (20), and a son, Travis (18).

Highlights of the Portland NOW April Board Meeting

Louisville Metro Police Report:

1. Officer Beaven is in line for a promotion and Officer Oliver may replace her as representative for PNI. Last week there were 16 reports in Beat 1 (Portland) out of 72 for all of District 1. This accounts for 20% of non-violent crimes.
2. There was a spike in violent crimes during the week of March 18-24th. There were shots fired at 3300 Bank St. with no injuries, a vehicle pursuit involving a wreck around 32nd and Alford resulted in a gun being thrown from the window of the car being chased. There was one arrest of the person who threw the gun. There was an assault on 28th St. with no arrests at this time. One member asked about the hot spots for violent activity. Officer Oliver referred membership to the louisvilleky.gov/lmpd web site and drill down to find Portland.
3. As the days get longer and the weather warmer, Officer Oliver asked for help with eyes to uncover juvenile vandalism in the area. The phone number is 502-571-7111 ex. 5 to get to the dispatcher.
4. Pete O'Connell asked about an abandoned car with Indiana license plates at 22nd and Portland. A discussion ensued about police response to abandoned cars. Officer Oliver said unless the car was stolen, it would not be towed because the tow lot was full. All he could do was place a citation on the car. Officer Oliver did say there were several new tow sites being considered and one of them was in the Portland area. Officer Oliver left and came back and said he had run the plates on the car and it wasn't stolen, but he placed a citation on the car.

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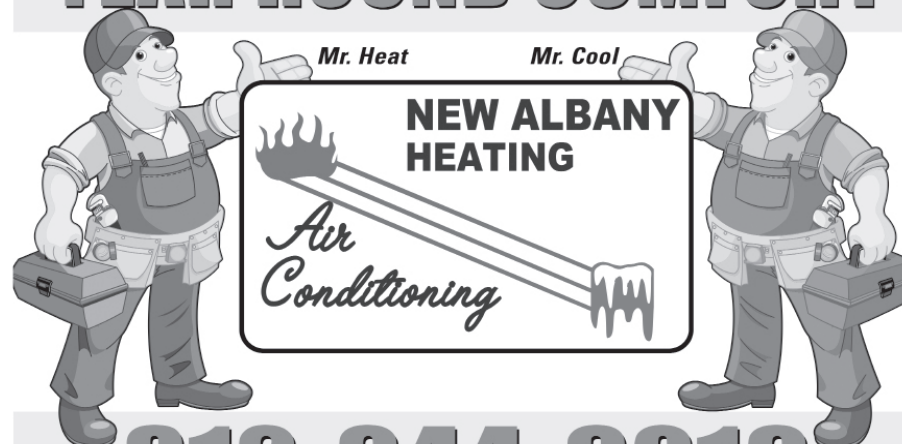
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**7th annual *How-To Festival*

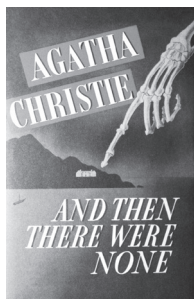

Keep your child safe in your car!

Why does my child need a car seat or booster seat?

Kids who ride in car seats and booster seats are much safer than kids who don't! Motor vehicle crashes are the second leading cause of injury death for children under 3. Kentucky law requires every child less than 40 inches tall to ride in a car seat. Children who are 40 to 57 inches tall and less than 8 years old must ride in a booster seat. You can be pulled over and get a fine if you violate these laws.

What kind of child safety seat does my child need?

The kind of seat your child needs depends on his/her age, weight, and height. There are 3 steps your child will go through *before* they are big enough to use a seat belt by itself.

1. Rear-facing car seat

Your baby should ride in a rear-facing car seat until they are 2 years old and weigh 30 lbs. Use an infant car seat (has a handle for carrying) until your baby is too heavy for it (usually at 22 lbs.). Then switch to a rear-facing toddler car seat, which stays in the car and has a higher weight limit for rear-facing.

2. Forward-facing car seat

Children who are over 2 years old and weigh at least 30 lbs. can ride in a forward-facing car seat. Keep using the forward-facing seat until your child outgrows the weight or height limits.

3. Booster seat

Children who are 40 inches tall can use a booster seat. Without a booster seat, the seat belt will not fit your child well and they could be seriously injured in a car crash. Booster seats allow your child to use the regular adult shoulder seat belt safely. Use either a backless or a high-back booster seat.

How can I make sure my child's car seat or booster seat is installed correctly?

Always follow all instructions that come with the car seat and that are listed in the owner's manual of your car. Car seats are complicated! 9 out of 10 child safety seats are not installed correctly, and even small mistakes put your child at risk in a car wreck. If your child already has a car seat or booster seat, you can have it checked by a certified Child Passenger Safety Technician (CPST) to make sure it is installed correctly. Recipes from the Ladies of Baptist Tabernacle

Mother's Day is in May, so I thought it would be fun to share some recipes that our Mom's fed us, or even taught us how to make.

Deviled Eggs

Raise you hand if deviled eggs was one of the first things your mom taught you how to make.

12 eggs, boiled, peeled and halved
1-2 Tbs. Worcestershire sauce
½ c mayonnaise
1 Tbs. Mustard
2Tbs pickle relish
Salt and pepper to taste

Place yolks from hard-boiled eggs into a bowl. Mash yolks with a fork. Add next 4 ingredients and mix until well blended. Add salt and pepper. Spoon mixture into egg white halves. Sprinkle paprika on top.

Cheeseburger Pie

Quick and easy for mom, this recipe always pleased my family's palate

1 lb hamburger
salt and pepper to taste
1 c chopped onion
2 tomatoes, sliced
1 ½ c milk
1 c shredded Cheddar Cheese
¾ c baking mix
3 eggs

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Spray 10X1½ pie plate with non-stick spray. Brown hamburger and onions and drain. Spread in plate. Beat milk, baking mix, eggs, salt and pepper until smooth. Pour over hamburger. Bake 25 minutes. Top with tomatoes and cheese. Bake another 5-8 minutes. Cool for 5 minutes.



Pineapple Upside Down Cake

Mom often made this cake and I always wondered why. Then I read where this cake was a favorite with men. Wasn't Mom clever?

1 box of yellow cake mix
1 can. pineapple rings
1 stick of margarine
1 jar maraschino cherries
1 c brown sugar

Heat oven 360 degrees. Melt margarine in a 9X13 inch cake pan. Add brown sugar. You may want to add more sugar. Stir sugar until melted in butter. Place pineapple rings on brown sugar. Reserve juice. Put a cherry in middle of pineapple. Prepare cake mix according to directions EXCEPT for one change. Pour pineapple juice in measuring cup then add water to cup to fulfill cake mix directions. Pour cake batter into cake pan slowly as not to displace pineapples. Bake according to directions. Let cool. Run a knife around the edge of cake pan and invert on cake holder. Tap gently on cake pan bottom to insure "the good stuff" isn't stuck in cake pan.

Skillet Fried Corn

Whenever fresh corn on the cob was available Mom would fix this for supper. Yum!

4 slices bacon, fried crisp and crumbled
3 cups fresh corn cut from cob
½ chopped onion
½ chopped green pepper
salt and pepper to taste

Add vegetable to bacon grease and cook over low heat, covered, for 10 minutes. Add salt and pepper. Place in bowl and top with bacon crumbs.

Hoppin' John

We had this on New Year's Day and lots of other times during the year.

4 slices bacon
1 med. Onion, copped
1 can (16 oz.) black eyed peas
1 cup instant rice
1 cup hot water
salt and pepper

Dice bacon and place in a 2 qt. Cover with a towel. Microwave on high for 3-4 minutes until crisp. Without draining add onion and stir well. Microwave, uncovered, 2-4 minutes. Add remaining ingredients, cover. Microwave 8-10 minutes.



Lasagna

Whenever Mother made lasagna we did not have to be called twice to the dinner table, because we would all be in the kitchen helping. This was definitely a family project.

1 box lasagna noodles
2 lb. hamburger
2 lb. Cottage cheese
2 jars spaghetti sauce
2 eggs
1 lb mozzarella cheese

Heat over 350 degrees. Boil lasagna noodles according to directions. Meanwhile, brown hamburger, drain, add sauce. In a bowl combine eggs and cottage cheese. In a 9X13 baking pan layer bottom with noodles. Add meat sauce. Add another layer of noodles. Add egg mixture. Add a layer of mozzarella cheese. Repeat until the finished with meat/sauce mixture. Sprinkle parmesan cheese and any left over mozzarella. Bake 50 minutes. Let stand for at least 5 minutes (if you can wait) before serving.

Chat with Gill Holland, Portland Investment Initiative. With:

GILL HOLLAND: Recently I had the chance to sit down with Gill Holland of Portland Investment Initiative for a brief chat about more issues and opportunities for Portland than we could possibly cover. We began with a small list of topics

*Vision *Gentrification *Indigenous Poor *Addiction & Homeless *What can "I" do *What can "you" do. **What are solutions? I will try summarizing our taped interview a bit.

* VISION: Full utilization capitalizing on Portland's very unique historic and cultural assets such as the Museum, The Portland Anchor, The Dam, and historic businesses to help attract the resources and talent for a dynamic revitalization beyond the view of the past. With seemingly insurmountable issues such as livable income jobs, 1400 vacant homes, education, poverty, health, and addiction, which are showing a degree of solution. Fundamentally the realization of the opportunities and issues we address now.

* GENTRIFICATION: Likely the most divisive and feared subject to most residents

of Portland. Gill addressed straight up that it is a positive necessity to create the talent with adequate resources to renovate and maintain a sustainable community, using a term "surgical gentrification" meaning a very grass root initiative to create systemic benefit to absolute maximum of all the people. Gill used the term Surgical Gentrification later that month in a Facebook article for Strong Towns that went viral with media.

* INDIGENOUS POOR: The massive proportion of poverty and the issues related to poverty was discussed and the divide between the resources available, and the utilization of those resources by people who are below the last rung of the social ladder. This is a subject that requires more attention to detail for some solutions.

* ADDICTS, HOMELESS & HOBOS: They are often the same as Indigenous Poor or have common issues, with few if any opportunities or options, often due to their own doing. None the less, they are totally disenfranchised, persecuted, and prosecuted relentlessly for drug conditions, creating violent deadly traumatic stress and depression. This would simply not be acceptable for any other form of physical or mental malady. We discussed the very positive results the Nelligan Art Alley Hobos have accomplished in creating the most sustained and visible street hygiene in Louisville's filthiest most dangerous Interstate Ramp at 22nd & Portland. The Hobos have come a long way over the past 3 years, and have a long journey ahead with hope of peace, safety, and a home. It Is Working.

*What can "I" do? *What can "YOU" do? *What are Solutions? Think Out Loud. Gill responded that we have only scratched the surface of critical opportunities & issues and requested we extend the interview into a second part. +++++ END PART 1
