Over the last several months Good Shepherd Renovations Committee has been hard at work. We've identified necessary Capital Improvements and have been working diligently with the Archdiocese of Louisville to determine possible funding sources for these projects.

We have secured sufficient funding to begin immediate work on some of the most pressing renovation items. All work that is currently underway is being funded by a \$200k grant from the Archdiocese, Historical Tax Credits, funds raised from #iGiveCatholic Day of Giving and a low interest loan from the Archdiocese. The work underway includes new roof of the rectory and garage and gutter replacement, rectory tuckpointing, stairs and sidewalk replacement, church exterior painting, parking lot repairs and resurfacing, Lehmann Hall roof replacement, church doors rehabilitation, and a church interior rendering for future painting.

As you can see, big things are happening at Good Shepherd Catholic Parish, 3525 Rudd Avenue!



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


Portland Museum Welcomes Intern

He approached me and asked, "Are you Gordon Brown who used to be at the Boy's Club?" "Yes, that's me.", I responded. "Well, I'm Todd Westbay", he said. And memories instantly came back of Todd as a member of the Boys' Club whom I had not seen since he was in his teens. I knew him and his family. We talked and caught up.

After lunch I was walking out, and another man stood from a table closer to the door. He said "Excuse me, but are you Gordon Brown who used to be at the Boys' Club?" "Yes", I responded. He said, "I thought so. I'm Merrill Harris. I was a member of the Boy's Club". Merrill, too, was in his teens when I last saw him. We agreed that we had both changed over the years. We reminisced about those days long ago.

Both Todd and Merrill are lifelong Portland residents. Both had careers with the ironworkers. It was so good to see them and share memories.

On my way home, the idea of "corner" came to mind. Is Cup of Joy an example of the "corner" of yesteryear? I am certain that other "corners" exist in Portland. 



2024: TURNING A NEW LEAF I'm working on a brief presentation to the city council (which anyone can request) and I want to let you know my plan. I think I'll use the Socratic method of "just asking questions" for greatest effect... Give 'em the "what where why who when how much" treatment. In my heart, I know that if we want to keep Louisville weird then we all must help keep Portland being Portland. See here:

"Many people say that Portland is a war zone, but to that I ask, "Do we really have trenches like the Donbas or tunnels like Gaza and Berlin, to which we say No...but we could! I could go for a bike tunnel under the Ohio River; all it'll take is fundraising. What is a war-zone without a tunnel? But I digress. Military academics have regaled how war is like endless hours of quiet boredom, punctuated by brief moments of extreme intensity. How do our neighbors turn moments of boredom into wild experience in Portland? Intersection takeover, Listen now: Not too many weekends ago, Northwestern Parkway and Portland Ave intersection was taken over by a midnight mob who watched hot rodders squeal, peel, and spin donuts for about an hour. Hamburger Casserole

- 1 lb hamburger
- 1 c. cream of mushroom soup
- 1 pkg. Tater Tots or Hash Browns
- ¹/₄ cup milk 1 c. mixed vegetables
- 1 medium onion. chopped
- $\frac{1}{2}$ c. shredded cheese

Brown hamburger and onions. Line Tater Tots or Hash Browns in a 9 x 13 inch pan. Cover with hamburger and onion mixture. Combine milk to soup in bowl add mixed vegetables and mix well. Pour on top of hamburger mixture. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-55 minutes.

Lasagna


- 2 lbs recotta or cottage cheese
- 2 eggs
- 2 lbs hamburger
- 1 lb Mozzarella cheese (more if you like)
- 2 jars pasta sauce
- 1 box Lasagna noodles
- oregano (use for your own taste)



You might do well if there is another person to help prepare this with you. Boil lasagna noodles until tender. In a bowl combine eggs and cottage cheese. Cook hamburger, drain and add sauce. In a 9×13 inch pan start with a layer of lasagna noodles. Add meat sauce. Layer of noodles and cheese and egg mixture. Add mozzarella cheese layer. Repeat until finished. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and shredded mozzarella cheese. Bake in 350 degree oven for 50 minutes.

Chili

1 lb hamburger1 tsp p1 c. red kidney beans½ tsp p1 c. hot chili beans1 med1 c. tomato sauce1





Add water if needed chili pepper to taste (make sure you put it on the table for those who like a lot). Fry hamburger until pink disappears. Drain. Place in Dutch oven or a large pan. Add remaining ingredients. Cook over medium heat. Some folks like thick chill, others like it more runny. That's what the extra water if for. I aim to please all of you chili lovers. Oh, another thing, some people like spaghetti in their chili. So, perhaps you could boil some just in case.Of course, you will need crackers or corn bread. So, which ever you favor have some handy. And shredded sharp cheddar cheese and more chopped onions. Now, that should please everyone.

Winter Fire Safety

The Louisville Fire Department would like to thank readers of the Portland Anchor for their efforts to prevent loss of life and property from fire.

Winter months are particularly hazardous as more people are home for more hours, more home cooking takes place, and people frequently turn to portable space heaters. The top five leading causes of home fires are cooking, heating, electrical, intentional, and smoking. The top predictor of surviving a fire is having an operational smoke alarm.

If you need yours checked, please call 311 and we will come visit you. If you need a smoke alarm, we will provide one and install it for you.

Remember to never leave food unattended while cooking, keep 3 feet clearance around space heaters, and have a home escape plan so that everyone in your family knows how to get out and where to meet.

We wish you a fire safe winter!

Stay active even when it's cold outside!

Winter is here! Cold weather and shorter days make it harder to find the time and motivation to be active. Many of us feel like hibernating instead! But physical activity is important all year round. Almost all of us would feel better, be able to do more, and be healthier by being more active than we are now. Physical activity is a great way to lose weight too!

Being *physically active* means engaging in aerobic exercises and strengthening exercises. Adults should aim for 30 minutes of moderate aerobic exercises 3 to 5 days a week (walking, aerobics, biking, yard work – anything that works your heart and lungs). Adults should also do 8 to 10 strengthening exercises 2 to 3 days a week (anything that strengthens your muscles by making them work against resistance). Start small! Get support. Try some of the free resources below! And talk with your doctor before you start a physical activity program.

Exercising outside

- Wear layers Exercise makes a lot of body heat, but once you start to tire and the sweat dries, you can get chilled. Dress in layers that you can take off since you start to sweat and then put back on as needed. And don't forget a hat or headband – more than 30% of your body heat is lost through your head!
- Be visible Wear light or reflective clothing so drivers can see you, especially since it gets dark early.
- Drink plenty of fluids Drink water before, during and after your workout, even if you're not thirsty. You can become just as dehydrated in the cold as in the heat.

Exercising indoors

Walk around the block.

- Walk up and down the hallway or the stairs in your house or apartment building.
- Create a home gym with a set of weights, an exercise ball and a jump rope.
