LVA again offers unique and exciting Spring and Summer Art Camps for 2021. Info and registration are available at: https://www.louisvillevisualart.org/campsworkshops.

The Spring Break Camp - *Spring Into Action!* – runs at the Holy Trinity Clifton campus March 29 - April 2. Mornings are for artistic creativity and discovery; afternoons are for exploration, games, and fun outside. Kids from all parts of Louisville are encouraged to sign up.

Summer Camps offer additional locations, with some sites able to accommodate extended hours. As with Spring Break Camp, Summer Art Camps focus on artmaking in the morning, with energetic activities in the afternoon. Camps occur at Holy Trinity Clifton Campus, Waterfront Park, Waterfront Botanical Gardens, and at LVA's Lytle Street facility in Portland. The Botanical Gardens Camp will offer round-trip transportation each day for campers residing in western Louisville Neighborhoods.

Many students have followed a first experience of LVA's exceptional art education curriculum in an Art Camp with continued success in our school-year programs, Children's Fine Art Classes (grades 4-8), and the Academy of LVA (grades 9-12). Camps are a great way for students with interest in visual art to gain knowledge and confidence that may even lead to a career as an artist.

Summer Camps all meet for one week, Monday through Friday. Most follow a 9am-4pm schedule, but it is important to check the link above for specifics. There are angerous dogs roaming around 35th and Rudd. Two dogs, a tan pit bull and a white husky, recently killed 4 of 5 feral cats that were being fed by the Portland Cat Lady. At age 84, she still feeds over 30 cats at several locations twice a day. All the cats were fixed by the T-N-R program. The one surviving cat is still recouping at the veterinary office. The dogs have tasted blood, so please be very careful if you are out alone in the area. Take extra precautions, for the kids and the elderly. If you know the whereabouts of the dogs in question, please call Animal Control.



COVID-19 Vaccine Information

Vaccine shots to protect against COVID-19 infection are now available in Kentucky! You are probably wondering whether to get one and how to get one. See below:

WHY should I get a COVID-19 vaccine?

- The COVID-19 vaccines available today are almost **95% effective** in preventing COVID-19.
- **COVID-19 is deadly.** The risks of serious illness from COVID-19, including hospitalization and death, greatly increase with age.
- **COVID-19 vaccines are safe.** More than **30 million Americans** have already received their first dose of the vaccine.
- Vaccines are not used in the United States until extensive testing takes place. All testing results are reviewed carefully by the FDA before they allow vaccines to be used.
- The more people get vaccinated, the sooner we can all go back to work, school, church and our normal lives.
- If you have questions or concerns about getting the COVID-19 vaccine, talk to you primary care provider.

WHEN can I get a COVID-19 vaccine?

Kentucky is vaccinating people in phases as vaccine supplies increase. Currently people in Phase 1A and Phase 1B can get the vaccine. Phase 1C may be able to get the vaccine in April.

- Phase 1A: Healthcare workers and nursing home residents
- **Phase 1B**: First responders, K-12 Educators, childcare workers, and anyone 70 years or older
- **Phase 1C:** Anyone 60 years or older, people with certain chronic diseases, and certain essential workers.
- Phase 2: Anyone 40 or older
- Phase 3: Anyone 16 or older
- **Phase 4**: Children under the age of 16 (if the vaccine is approved for this age group).

WHERE can I get a COVID-19 vaccine?

- Right now, vaccines are available at multiple hospitals in Louisville. New vaccine locations are expected to open soon. Go to www.louisvilleky.gov/vaccine or call (502) 912-8598 for more information.
- You will likely need 2 doses, 3 to 4 weeks apart. During your appt. for your 1st dose, staff will help you schedule your 2nd dose at the same location.
- The vaccine will be free.

Once I am vaccinated, what will be different?

- Your risk of getting COVID-19 will be greatly reduced or eliminated. You will no longer be at risk of hospitalization or death due to COVID-19.
- You must still wear a mask and practice social distancing. Scientists are still researching whether you can spread COVID-19 to others even after getting the vaccine and even if you don't get sick. It will be months before everyone around you is vaccinated.



Roll up your sleeves, rent the tools you'll need and start trimming, mowing and planting for this spring!

On Saturday, March 27th, 2021, Habitat for Humanity of Metro Louisville will open our Garden Tool Library at The Portland Neighborhood ReStore located at 1631 Rowan Street, 40203. You will be able to rent tools to trim bushes, mow the grass, trim weeds, plant flowers and much more. Here's how the Garden Tool Library will work:

The Garden Tool Library will be open on Saturday, March 27th, from 10:00 am-2:00 pm at the Portland Neighborhood ReStore. In order to rent a tool, renters will:

- Need to have their ID or an official mail piece be photocopied.
- Pay a \$5 fee for hand tools or \$15 fee for gas or electric power tools.
- All charges are reimbursed when the tools are returned to the Portland Neighborhood ReStore by 3:30 pm on March 27. If the tools are not returned on 3/27, a \$1/day fee will be deducted from your reimbursement.





Knifed in the Back 40 What I Did:

I perennially blow my back out tilling and hauling wheelbarrows of dirt for gardening in summer and then autumn's chopping and stacking wood for winter burning. I pined for a necessary unblowing-out of my back. So I saw an advert for free voga at the Health Dept (pre pandemic). Oh boy, did that feel good -- and hurt-- and helped out in many ways. So I'm now a devotee. Thanks to the health center for offering the classes both at the center and on zoom (for the pandemic). Yoga keeps me on track to ensure my back is limber and strong for working in dirt and around heavy wood. Tuna Casserole

 $1 \ 1/2 \ \text{cup egg noodles}$

1 cup grated cheddar cheese

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1/3 cup chopped onion

¹/₂ cup milk

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup broken potato chips

7-oz. Can tuna, drained and flaked paprika

Heat oven to 425 degrees. Grease 1 quart casserole. Cook noodles according to package directions. Drain. Place into mixing bowl. Stir in soup, milk, tuna, cheese, and onion. Mix well. Put in casserole. Sprinkle with potato chips and paprika. Bake for 15 minutes or until bubbling.



1 ¹/₂ tsp baking powder 1 small onion finely chopped $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt

1 large egg

¹/₄ c flour

³/₄ c milk

Oil for deep frving (3-4 inches)

In a large bowl combine dry ingredients. Whisk egg, milk and onion, add to dry ingredients until combined. Heat oil to 365 degrees. In cast iron skillet or Dutch oven drop batter by tablespoonfuls and fry until golden brown (2-2/12 minutes) Drain and serve warm.

Tip: Be sure to maintain heat between 350 -375 degrees. If you like your pups a little spicy, add a tsp of chili powder.
