## Monument Unveiling in Remembrance of Officer Nick Rodman

On March 29, 2019 a monument in front of the 1st Division Police Station on 29th Street, was unveiled in honor of Officer Nick Rodman, who lost his life in the line of duty on March 29, 2017 in the Portland neighborhood. Officer Rodman worked in the 1st Division and was married with 2 young children. The monument was paid for and donated by the 1st Division Police Auxiliary, Metro Council woman Cheri Bryant Hamilton and members of the Metro Council. Auxiliary president Jerry Brinson spearheaded the fundraising campaign for the monument.

Officer Rodman's wife and his parents were there for the unveiling. Mayor Fischer and LMPD Chief Steve Conrad spoke at the unveiling ceremony. “I hope this monument reminds us how everyday police officers in this division and throughout this city suit up and show up to face whatever comes their way...and unfortunately sometimes they end up giving their all,” LMPD Chief Conrad said.

**Dear Ann(PORT)Landers,**

I recently visited the Portland Wharf Park and was shocked to see its condition. What happened to that park being a great peaceful place to take the family for a picnic or bike ride? Now it's all muddy and just too noisy to be there because of the dirt bikes and four-wheelers.

**ANSWER:**

With the spring weather here I'm sure everyone is looking for places to visit and what better place than one of the 120 Metro-owned Parks. The Portland Wharf Park is located at the entrance to the old K&I bridge at 31st St and Northwestern Pkwy. It actually has an official address...719 N 32nd St. It is a 55 acre site that spans along the Ohio River from the Shawnee Golf Course (west) to the McAlpine Locks(east), and back to the levee wall. Pedestrian entry access to the park is via the RiverWalk Trail at 31st St. There is **NO VEHICULAR TRAFFIC** permitted in this park (other than Service vehicles). That includes All-Terrain Vehicles (ATVs) with

the definition of ATV being any motorized off road vehicle.

Years ago there actually was a sign posted with park rules but it was removed (likely stolen for the metal) and it has never been replaced. There was also a pole that was kept locked to prevent vehicular traffic from entering. Same fate there...removed and never replaced.

The Portland Wharf park does not have the developed amenities of other parks. It is a park that has been cut off from the neighborhood by the levee wall. It is more of a natural park, a "Wonderland" composed of open grasses and wetlands, dense thicket, weedy non-natives, and native species (American Elm, Hackberry, Box Elder, Black Locust and Willow). All along the shore where trees have not been removed, mostly to the west and east, there are Cottonwoods and Silver Maples.

All this is intertwined with informal dirt paths throughout the park that eventually connect to the Shawnee Golf course. The formal RiverWalk Trail has been badly neglected and is currently impassable.

This mostly untouched park (with the exception of the man-made damage caused by vehicular traffic from the cars, trucks, and off road vehicles) is an historically important part of Portland's beginnings. Before the flooding the area was a small thriving commercial and residential wharf of warehouses, housing, and shops.

I urge all that read this to contact Metro Parks, 574-7275, parks@louisvilleky.gov, and voice an opinion about the condition of the park.

And please, never stop using this special space for kite-flying, blanket picnics, runs, or bike rides, etc. It has been my personal experience that the motorized vehicle operators are generally respectful of pedestrians.

Don't let that levee wall be a deterrent to Portland's inherent connection to the river. Take a walk and let your imagination run wild then compare your ideas to the 2002 Portland Wharf Park Master Plan.





in Flander's fields.



## Portland Library Lands the Elect

The annual Cafe Louie event was held at the Portland Library on March 22nd (9am Saturday) with perfect attendance from our local elected officials: Attica Scott, Charles Booker, Gerald Neale, Donna Purvis, and Barbara Sexton Smith. Local beverage was provided by Heine Bros and local breakfast pastries from Farm to Fork. Several dozen local citizens were present and many asked questions to these leaders via notecards. The answers to many are summarized here, but that doesn't take the place of being there; make plans to attend next year. The Elect were clear about seeking to empower women and girls, decrease poverty, restore voting rights to convicted felons having done their time (like 48 other states). Of course the state and local budget crisis loomed: ideas are to impose a restaurant tax, cigarette tax, gambling tax, cutting excess bureaucracy, cutting services, cutting neighborhood development discretionary funds--It was acknowledged that raising taxes decreases ability to get re-elected, but this is an example of public service. No clear resolution can be seen. About the question about how to get involved, the elect suggested to just call so that their call tallies can be exclaimed in floor (knife-fight) discussions. And just attend meetings of committees or the council. And start sharing passion and ideas now rather than waiting until the session starts in January (too late then). Prepare to protest dumb ideas, like cutting public education. Use TARC to get downtown and organize a van pool to Frankfort. It was clarified that our bridges (infrastructure) is not a priority to the state. Best ways to keep informed: LRC.ky.gov (Bill Watch; 525, 2015), follow civic organizations like KFTC and ACLU, get the KET App, and watch videos/livestreams of meetings at LVLKKY.gov (sic)...and read 8 white papers posted there. The most zen moment was when some of the elect said to get passionate about what you care about, while others mentioned to not take it personal nor get overly defensive. Politicals are reaching out to Portland via the library's priority of sponsoring Cafe Louie--will you reach out to the community and the leaders (servants) therein?



## Louisville Visual Art's Annual art[squared] Exhibition and Sale Draws Largest Crowd Ever to Support Children's Fine Art Classes



With great success, on Friday and Saturday, April 12 and 13, Louisville Visual Art (LVA) hosted the 2019 art[squared] exhibition and sale in its LVA Gallery at 1538 Lytle Street in Portland. Featuring more than 200 8-inch-by-8-inch canvases donated by local artists, this unique fundraiser offered attendees the chance to buy any of the original artworks on display for \$100 each. The show was hung in a grid covering the gallery walls, where the works remained anonymous until purchased. When a piece was bought, it came down to reveal the name of the generous artist who created it and contributed it in support of Children's Fine Art Classes (CFAC).

In addition to the 8-inch-by-8-inch works priced at \$100 apiece, art[squared] also featured three special 24-inch-by-24-inch paintings created by selected artists and sold in a silent auction. The three 2019 art[squared] featured artists were Richard Sullivan, Hawk Alfredson, and LaNia Roberts. Mr. Sullivan, a noted painter of sports-themed works, operates a studio in Portland, as does Mr. Alfredson, who recently moved to Louisville with his wife, Mia Hanson, after living and working as an artist in New York City for 20 years. LVA Executive Director, Lindy Casebier, expressed admiring gratitude for the talent and generosity of these three accomplished local artists and for the outpouring of support from all who attended the event or made a purchase.

Proceeds from art[squared] specifically benefit scholarships that make it possible for talented and motivated young artists in the Metro Area to attend CFAC without lack of financial means posing a barrier. Meeting outside of regular school hours, CFAC classes enroll students in grades 4 – 8, and run at more than 30 venues across the Metro, including Portland Elementary School and Western Middle School for the Arts. Since 1925, these classes, taught by highly qualified local artists, have helped to build momentum in Louisville's visual art culture by nurturing generations of young people in the most formative stages of their development. It is a testament to the program's enduring value that a number of former CFAC students contribute works to art[squared] every year.

Art[squared] 2019 was better attended than any of the event's previous five iterations, welcoming as many as 300 attendees over the course of Friday evening. The energy of acrobatic entertainment by CirqueLouis and music by DJ Sam Sneed filled the Gallery and flowed into the parking lot, where balmy spring weather made it pleasant to be outside. The Board and Staff of LVA were pleased that Mayor Greg Fischer, Senator Gerald Neal, and many other luminaries of the art and philanthropic communities were able to attend. LVA Gallery Director, Keith Waits, had this to say about the event, "It's a wonderful opportunity to connect artists and collectors that truly puts art within everyone's reach."

## Keep your child safe in your car!

### Why does my child need a car seat or booster seat?

Kids who ride in car seats and booster seats are much safer than kids who don't! Motor vehicle crashes are the second leading cause of injury death for children under 3. Kentucky law requires every child less than 40 inches tall to ride in a car seat. Children who are 40 to 57 inches tall and less than 8 years old must ride in a booster seat. You can be pulled over and get a fine if you violate these laws.

### What kind of child safety seat does my child need?

The kind of seat your child needs depends on his/her age, weight, and height. There are 3 steps your child will go through *before* they are big enough to use a seat belt by itself.

#### 1. Rear-facing car seat

Your baby should ride in a rear-facing car seat until they are at least 2 years old and weigh at least 30 lbs. Use an infant car seat (has a handle for carrying) until your baby is too heavy for it (usually at 22 lbs.). Then switch to a rear-facing toddler car seat, which stays in the car and has a higher weight limit for rear-facing.

#### 2. Forward-facing car seat

Children who are over 2 years old and weigh at least 30 lbs. can ride in a forward-facing car seat with harnesses. Keep using the forward-facing seat until your child outgrows the weight or height limits.

#### 3. Booster seat

Children who are 40 inches tall can use a booster seat. Without a booster seat, the seat belt will not fit your child well and they could be seriously injured in a car crash. Booster seats allow your child to use the regular adult shoulder seat belt safely. Use either a backless or a high-back booster seat.

### How can I make sure my child's car seat or booster seat is installed correctly?

Always follow all instructions that come with the car seat and that are listed in the owner's manual of your car. Car seats are complicated! 9 out of 10 child safety seats are not installed correctly, and even small mistakes put your child at risk in a car wreck. If your child already has a car seat or booster seat, you can have it checked by a certified Child Passenger Safety Technician (CPST) to make sure it is installed correctly. On Tuesday, March 28, 2017, Louisville Metro Police Department Officer Nick Rodman was struck while in his vehicle, pursuing a violent felon. Officer Rodman paid the ultimate sacrifice after the fiery crash the following day.

Officer Rodman left behind his wife, two-year-old son, and four-week-old daughter. In an effort to honor Officer Rodman, his wife Ashley has created a new organization to honor Nick's memory, the Nick Rodman Legacy Foundation.

"When Nick was killed in the line of duty, it was almost like the entire city of Louisville was mourning so deeply with us. The amount of love and support that we still receive even two years later is beyond amazing. Nick loved this city. He was born and raised in Louisville. He loved Louisville so much that he convinced me to move here and start our family. And then he was killed while protecting the city he loved and adored. Losing Nick and living this life without him has been incredibly painful, but I know that he would be so proud of our community. The way family, friends and even strangers have stepped up to support and love on myself,



our kids and our family has been absolutely beautiful.

With a huge leap of faith, love, hard work, tears, and support from family and friends, I decided to start a nonprofit organization in honor of Nick's beautiful life while supporting and helping those in need. Now more than ever, I understand the importance of people supporting and loving on each other during hard times. In our darkest moments, the community of Louisville stepped up to help me and our family- from showing their presence at an event, making signs, tying blue ribbons on trees along Southern Parkway, giving donations, sending letters

and cards, attending fundraisers, to sending items to my kids and me. It is important for me to now return the favor, to say thank you to the community of Louisville for loving Nick and for taking care of us in our darkest times," says Ashley Rodman.

The not-for-profit organization will raise funds to benefit local organizations that Nick was passionate about or utilized to help Louisvillians in need who he met while on duty with LMPD.

## Recipes from the Ladies of Baptist Tabernacle

May is the month we recognize all the love and sacrifice our mothers gave in making us the people we are today. Baptist Tabernacle is sharing recipes from mothers who are no longer with us.

### German Potato Salad - Ruth Gillespie

6 med. Potatoes  
1 tsp salt  
6 slices of bacon  
½ tsp celery seed  
¼ cup chopped onion  
Dash of pepper  
2 Tbs. Flour  
¼ cup vinegar  
3 Tbs. sugar  
¾ cup water



Cook potatoes, cool and slice. Fry bacon and crumble. Brown onion in bacon fat until lightly browned. Blend in flour, sugar, salt, pepper, and celery seed. Cook over low heat until smooth and bubbly stirring constantly. Add water and vinegar. Boil for one minute. Pour dressing over potatoes and add crumbled bacon.

### Red Bean Salad - Elma Birch

1 c Red beans, drained  
½ cup celery, chopped  
½ cup radishes, chopped  
½ cup green pepper, chopped  
½ cup pickle relish  
¼ cup onion, chopped



Mix all ingredients with 2 Tbs. salad dressing or mayonnaise until well blended.

### Tuna Casserole - Dodie Crowe

2 cups of tuna  
1 can Cream of Mushroom soup  
1 pkg. frozen chopped broccoli  
½ cup Cream cheese

Put tuna in baking dish. Cook broccoli until tender, drain and arrange over tuna. Add ½ cup of water to Cream of Mushroom soup, mix and pour over mixture. Top with diced cream cheese. Bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes.

### Sauerkraut Salad - Mildred Kelly

1 can sauerkraut, chopped  
1 onion, chopped  
1 cup celery, chopped  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup green pepper, chopped  
¼ cup water



Mix sauerkraut, onion, green pepper, and celery. Boil water and sugar. Let cool. Pour over mixture and stir until well blended. Let stand for 30 minutes. Cover bowl tightly and refrigerate over night.

### Rotini Salad - Helen Johnson

½ box rotini  
1 chicken breast chopped  
1 diced tomato  
½ cup celery  
½ cup green pepper  
¼ cup green onion, chopped  
¼ cup sliced black olives



Cook rotini according to directions. Drain and place into bowl. Add the other ingredients. Toss with zesty Italian dressing. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

### Cabbage Casserole - Josephine Mitchell

½ head green cabbage  
3 slices white bread, cubed  
3 cups milk  
3 eggs  
¼ tsp cayenne pepper  
4 sm. Green onions  
1/3 cup melted butter  
¾ cup shredded cheese



Shred cabbage and barely cook tender in salted water. Drain well. While cabbage is cooking soak bread cubes in milk. Cut onions fine. Combine all the ingredients in a greased casserole. Top with shredded cheese and dot with butter. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes.

### Slaw - Lil Hill

1 head of cabbage, shredded  
1 green pepper, sliced thin  
1 sm. Jar of pimentos, drained  
1 med. Onion sliced thin and separated into rings

### Dressing

1 cup salad oil  
1 cup sugar  
¾ cup white vinegar  
1 tsp salt  
1 tsp celery seed



Mix ingredients and boil for 2 minutes. Pour over cabbage mixture and blend.

### Oatmeal Chocolate Chip Cookies - Jean Campbell

1 cup margarine, softened  
1 ¾ cups sugar  
2 eggs  
2 Tbs. milk  
2 tsp vanilla  
1 ¾ cups all purpose flour  
1 tsp baking soda  
2 Tbs. Dark syrup  
3 cups quick oats  
1 cup chopped nuts  
1 cup chocolate chips



Heat oven 350 degrees. Beat sugar and margarine until creamy. Add eggs, milk, vanilla and syrup. Blend well. Add oats, flour, soda and mix. Stir in chips and nuts. Drop a teaspoonful on cookie sheet and bake 9-10 minute. Watch closely.

1 cup white corn syrup


