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1 THE LOOKOUT FOR SOME BIG CHANGES***

QUESTIONS FOR THE CANDIDATES LOUISVILLE METRO COUNCIL DISTRICT 5

Question: What is the single biggest issue within Council District #5 right now?

Ray Barker: Public safety: We need to deal with the escalating violence in District 5, the mentally ill and the growing homelessness.

Donna Purvis: Unfortunately, there is more than one major issue and they all need attention and focus such as fifth, drugs, crime, vacant homes, lack of economic development. The current administration is aware of these deficiencies but insist that millions of dollars have been invested into the Westend. But where?! Why aren't these investments effective in improving the quality of life for the residents? I have been on the council for over three years and have not seen, if any, a return on investment. This does not include the affordable housing development either. Therefore, I will demand accountability!

Sherlena Watkins: There is a multifaceted answer to this question. While canvassing the communities within District 5, I have learned that the concerns vary depending on where the resident resides. Housing (affordable) and Crime were the top two (2) issues. District 5 has a large rental population and many of these residents have experience a significant increase in rent or they were advised by the landlord that an increase is coming. A tenant's union is needed. Violent crime is very much a concern for majority of the people with which I have spoken. Addressing the root causes and not just symptoms is a priority.

Question: Generally speaking there is a feeling that District #5 is one of the stepchildren in Louisville. What will you do to move our district to be equal with all districts in receiving city services.

Ray Barker: That is one of the reasons I am running to assure that the funds is being cut evenly, under my leadership we will work to rebrand District 5.

Donna Purvis: Keep publicly shaming those who do not care about the conditions of District 5! Demand if they can bond millions for non-essential projects, they can do the same for the things needed here in this district to improve our living! I will no longer accept the 'no' factor!

Sherlena Watkins: The people of West Louisville and Portland recognize that the city of Louisville has intentionally disinvested in District 5. The city officials and the powers that be, knew it would later use the blight, which is a direct result form the disinvestment, to gentrify an already marginalized community. I believe in equity. Not only should we receive what other districts are receiving but we should receive more as the disinvestment was intentional and brought harmed to District 5. To reconcile the intentional harm, the city must bring repair and that repair must come in the form of resources, which is determined by those who live in District 5. We are going to city hall to collect our check! We will use every legislative tool and service to advocate for those resources.

Question: If you received a \$1 million grant to use for District #5 any way you wanted, what would you do with it and why?

Ray Barker: I would create programs to help clean our communities, programs to help renovate these abandoned properties and get them back in service. Develop and network with existing programs to help keep our youths safe. Another goal is to strengthen our Block watch programs.

Donna Purvis: Though I don't think \$1 million would be enough, but clean up these streets and alleys, cut all vacant lots, and remove abandoned cars. I would need tools to help keep the areas clean like cameras and code enforcement officers to do their jobs on the serious violators and not continue to target the easy victims. These actions are needed to entice developers to come do business in our neighborhoods.

Sherlena Watkins: Once I have established the advisory board, collectively we will decide how to utilize the \$1 million grant. This is the people's seat and far too long the people have been left out of direct decision making.

Question: How do you plan to involve residents in the decision making process for items relative to District #5?

Ray Barker: By increasing the communication between metro council and the community. We do this through old formated such as newsletter and recreate new formats such as an open zoom line. Also Increase town hall meetings and install satellite offices in different parts of the community.

Donna Purvis: Reactivate and restructure my council advisory board to be the following: 1. 3 volunteers from each neighborhood; Chickasaw, Shawnee, Portland, Russell. 2. 2 volunteers each to review each council committee's legislation to see how it would affect or benefit D5. 3. Meet monthly (virtually) to discuss. 4. Take recommendations from the board to address or amend proposed legislation if needed for the benefit of D5.

Sherlena Watkins: As mentioned in answer #3 I plan to establish an advisory board that is reflective of the district. Our board will be active and meet as frequently as possible as we have pressing issues. Apart of my plan is to empower those who feel powerless.

Question: What's more important for District #5 right now: building new homes and commercial space or rehabbing/expanding/better utilizing our existing homes and storefronts?

Ray Barker: Rehabbing/expanding/better utilizing our existing homes and storefronts.

Donna Purvis: Because there are so many vacant structures in the district, it would be more sensible to address what is already here, whether that it is rehabbing or expanding or demolishing properties that is at a point of no return.

Sherlena Watkins: I must ensure that the disenfranchised and marginalized are made whole first and foremost. Having the resources to bring repair will allow the residents to purchase and maintain affordable new and rehabbed housing. I will advocate for the resident, who have the entrepreneur spirit, to receive grants and forgivable loan so that they may fund new and existing businesses. I will also advocate for companies, who pay a living wage, to relocate to West Louisville. It is important for those dollars to circulate at lease three (3) to four (4) times within the community before they go out of the community.





Cheeseburger Pie

Ouick and easy for mom, this recipe always pleased my family's palate

1 lb hamburger salt and pepper to taste

1 c chopped onion

2 tomatoes, sliced

1 ½ c milk

1 c shredded Cheddar Cheese

³/₄ c baking mix

3 eggs

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Spray 10X1½ pie plate with non-stick spray. Brown hamburger and onions and drain. Spread in plate. Beat milk, baking mix, eggs, salt and pepper until smooth. Pour over hamburger. Bake 25 minutes. Top with tomatoes and cheese. Bake another 5-8 minutes. Cool for 5 min-



Lasagna

Whenever Mother made lasagna we did not have to be called twice to the dinner table. because we would all be in the kitchen helping. This was definitely a family project.

1 box lasagna noodles

2 lb. hamburger

2 lb. Cottage cheese

2 jars spaghetti sauce

1 lb mozzarella cheese

Heat over 350 degrees. Boil lasagna noodles according to directions. Meanwhile, brown hamburger, drain, add sauce. In a bowl combine eggs and cottage cheese. In a 9X13 baking pan layer bottom with noodles. Add meat sauce. Add another layer of noodles. Add egg mixture. Add a layer of mozzarella cheese. Repeat until the finished with meat/ sauce mixture. Sprinkle parmesan cheese and any left over mozzarella. Bake 50 minutes. Let stand for at least 5 minutes (if you can wait)before serving.



Cottage Cheese Salad

Summer is coming and you may not feel like spending a lot of time in the kitchen with the oven on. So, here is a simple recipe that requires no cooking.

1 16oz. Container of low fat cottage cheese

1 T. parsley

½ cup chopped green pepper

1 T Mayonnaise/salad dressing

½ cup diced onion

Dash of paprika

1 carrot, finely grated salt and pepper to taste

Combine all the ingredients in a bowl with lid and refrigerate.



Pineapple Upside Down Cake

Mom often made this cake and I always wondered why. Then I read where this cake was a favorite with men. Wasn't Mom clever?

1 box of yellow cake mix

1 can, pineapple rings

1 stick of margarine 1 jar maraschino cherries

1 c brown sugar

Heat oven 360 degrees. Melt margarine in a 9X13 inch cake pan. Add brown sugar. You may want to add more sugar. Stir sugar until melted in butter. Place pineapple rings on brown sugar. Reserve juice.

Keep your child safe in your car!

Why does my child need a car seat or booster seat?

Kids who ride in car seats and booster seats are much safer than kids who don't! Motor vehicle crashes are the <u>second leading cause of injury death</u> for children under 3. Kentucky law requires every child less than 40 inches tall to ride in a car seat. Children who are 40 to 57 inches tall and less than 8 years old must ride in a booster seat. You can be pulled over and get a fine if you violate these laws.

What kind of child safety seat does my child need?

The kind of seat your child needs depends on his/her age, weight, and height. There are 3 steps your child will go through *before* they are allowed to use a seat belt by itself.

1. Rear-facing car seat

Your baby should ride in a rear-facing car seat until they are at least 2 years old and weigh at least 30 lbs. Use an infant car seat (has a handle for carrying) until your baby is too heavy for it (usually at 22 lbs.). Then switch to a rear-facing toddler car seat, which stays in the car and has a higher weight limit for rear-facing.

2. Forward-facing car seat

Children who are over 2 years old and weigh at least 30 lbs. can ride in a forward-facing car seat with harnesses. Keep using the forward-facing seat until your child outgrows the weight or height limits (usually 50 lbs. or higher).

3. Booster seat

Children who are 40 inches tall can use a booster seat. Without a booster seat, the seat belt will not fit your child well and they could be seriously injured in a car crash. Booster seats allow your child to use the regular adult shoulder seat belt safely. Use either a backless or a high-back booster seat.

How can I make sure my child's car seat or booster seat is installed correctly? Always follow all instructions that come with the car seat and that are listed in the owner's manual of your car. Car seats are complicated! 9 out of 10 child safety seats are not installed correctly, and even small mistakes put your child at risk in a car wreck. If your child already has a car seat or booster seat, you can have it checked by a certified Child Passenger Safety Technician (CPST) to make sure it is installed correctly. Abandoned Vehicles & Illegal Parking Could Cost You

___Vehicles include: Cars, vans, RV, trucks, trailers, boats, & acessory recreational vehicles.

__Parking of vehicles (motorcyles, trailers, etc.) cannot be on grass, but must be parked on a hard durable surface. Asphalt, brick, concrete paving and interlocking paving blocks, including semi pervious systems, are acceptable paving materials. Gravel may be permitted with approval.

___You may not park in your front or side yards, except in a driveway made of a hard and durable surface which leads to the house, garage or red yard.

The maximum number of vehicles allowed on residential lots is:

>20K square feet is 5

6K to 20K square feet is 4

<6K square feet is 3

- You may not be parked on a vacant lot.
- __You may **not operate a repair garage** in residentially zoned property.
- Heavy trucks are prohibited from parking in residentially zoned areas.
- __All motor vehicles outside an enclosed structure **must be licensed**. An unlicensed vehicle is an abandoned vehicle and not allowed.

__A vehicle is considered inoperable when it has flat tires, does not start, missing wheels, broken Windows or other missing parts required for driving. **Vehicles my not be in a state of major disassembly** or in the process of being stripped. A vehicle is only permitted to undergo major overhaul if the work is performed inside a structure or enclosed area.
