

Portland Museum receives a \$500,000 grant to build AHOY (Adventure House of You), Louisville's first Children's Museum



Portland Museum has received a \$500,000 gift from the James Graham Brown Foundation to support AHOY (Adventure House of You) - Louisville's first brick-and-mortar Children's Museum. The gift will enable Portland Museum to complete PHASE I of AHOY, which includes transforming a Victorian-era house adjacent to the Portland Museum into an experience where local heritage meets surrealism. This immersive Children's Museum will include educational opportunities, such as maritime exhibits that playfully juxtapose fact and folklore against a backdrop of climbing ropes, trapdoors, projected imagery, and rooftop gardens. AHOY will be a play ecosystem to encourage generations of children to be adventurous, bold, freethinkers.

"This grant will enable us to move forward with construction and help encourage other donors to become part of building this experience inspired by and rooted in Louisville's West End," said AHOY Director Danny Seim. "We are deeply grateful to the James Graham Brown Foundation for this generous support and are excited to build this experience for all of Louisville."

AHOY is inspired by the creativity and historical references of the St. Louis City Museum, the repurposed Victorian architecture of Oregon's Gilbert House,

For September there are four officers of the month. They are recognized for their outstanding service and work mentoring newer officers - in particular - on the late watch platoon. Due to a large amount of turnover, more than half of the platoon had less than one year of experience.

Their selflessness is appreciated, by the division supervisors, the officers that were mentored and by the community that they serve and protect every day. Each of these mentors were chosen for their knowledge and skill but during this program's tenure, they showed leadership abilities well beyond their years of service. Congratulations, Rosemary, and thank you for all you do for our parish family!



and Santa Fe's artist-driven Meow Wolf. Museums are renowned for their positive externalities, and much like City Museum, AHOY aims to be ever evolving in its design and a regional destination. For nearly five decades, the Portland Museum has served as a repository and interpreter of Portland's rich history. It has been a source of pride for West End residents and an educational resource to the region.

"We realize change is necessary to continue to share Portland's history and our people in a way that reaches contemporary audiences. We have an amazing opportunity at this moment to physically expand the footprint of the Museum, not just to have more space, but to truly create something driven by children and inspirational to all," said Katy Delahanty, Director of the Portland Museum. "This funding will do more than build AHOY; it will help construct a cultural hub for our Portland neighborhood and beyond."



The James Graham Brown Foundation has been a long-time supporter of the Portland Museum, dating back to the 1980s as it sought to become an anchor institution in the Portland neighborhood. Fall Recipes from around the neighborhood. . .

Broccoli, cheese and Potato Soup

1/4 cup butter 1 onion, finely diced 2 carrots, diced 1 T minced garlic

1/4 cup flour 4 c. vegetable broth

1 c. milk. 2% or whole 2 large Russet potatoes, diced

1 pound broccoli, florets chopped 2 cups sharp cheddar cheese,

shredded

sea salt, ground pepper

Dice the carrots and potatoes. Chop the broccoli florets from stem and chop to bite sized pieces. Melt butter in a soup pot, add carrots and onion. Stir and cook until onion is translucent. Add garlic. Add the flour, milk and broth. Stir well. Add potatoes. Stir and bring to a boil. Reduce to a simmer for 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Add broccoli. Simmer for about 10 minutes until potatoes are fork tender. Remove from heat, stir in shredded cheese. Serve with some cheese on top with some freshly ground pepper.



Pumpkin Oatmeal Cookies

1/2 cups old fashioned oats

2 1/3 cups flour

1 T.baking powder 1 tsp baking soda 2 tsp pumpkin spice 1 tsp salt

3/4 C butter (melted) 1/3 cup pumpkin puree

1 1/2 cups sugar

1 T. molasses

1 tsp vanilla extract

2 large eggs

Cinnamon Icing Ingredients

2 cups powdered sugar

1 tsp cinnamon

4 T. water

1 1/2 tsp vanilla

Preheat oven to 350°F and prepare two cookie sheets with parchment paper or non-stick silicone baking mats. Set aside. Stir together oats, flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, and salt in a medium mixing bowl and set aside. In a separate bowl, add the butter, pumpkin puree, sugar, molasses, and vanilla. Whisk to combine. Add eggs one by one, whisking as you go, until batter is smooth. Slowly begin to fold the dry ingredients into your bowl of wet ingredients, stirring until well combined. Your batter should be thick and easy to form into balls. If you have a medium cookie scoop, this makes it easy to portion out the dough. If rolling into balls by hand, you'll want to use about 1 1/2 Tablespoons of dough per cookie dough ball. Place the balls of dough onto your prepared cookie sheet. Gently press them down in the middle, just a tad. You don't need to flatten them. Bake for 10-12 minutes, rotating cookie sheets at the halfway mark. When the cookies are done they will start to turn golden brown. Remove from oven and allow too cool on the baking sheet for about five minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to finish cooling while you make the frosting.

Icing Directions

Whisk the powdered sugar, cinnamon, water and vanilla together in a small mixing bowl until you have a smooth glaze. Take each pumpkin oatmeal cookie and place face-down in the bowl of glaze, so that the top is coated. Flip right-side-up and place on the cooling rack again so the glaze can set. Repeat with each cookie. While frosting is still wet, sprinkle all of the cookies with cinnamon.

To make sure your cookies aren't mushy, I recommend blotting excess moisture from the canned pumpkin with a paper towel. If you like nuts, you could add chopped pecans or walnuts.



White Bean Chicken Chili

7 cups chicken broth 4 - 15.8 ounce cans of Bush's Beans great northern beans (cannellini or navy beans could be substituted) 1 t. parsley, cumin, oregano, paprika 1/4 tsp. ground red pepper (or ground cavenne pepper) 1/4 tsp. black pepper, salt 4 T. olive oil (divided) 1 1/4 pound chicken breast, cubed 1 cup onion, diced

1 T. jalapeno, chopped, optional

4 cloves garlic, minced

In a large stock pot bring chicken broth and beans to a boil. Add all seasonings (parsley, cumin, oregano, paprika, red pepper, black pepper, salt). Reduce heat to medium and let simmer. In a saute pan heat 2 tablespoons of olive oil over medium high heat. Add chicken and saute about 3-5 minutes then add chicken to the large pot. In saute pan heat the remaining 2 tablespoons of olive oil over medium heat. Add onion, garlic and ialapeno and saute until softened, about 5 minutes. Add to pan with the onion, garlic and jalapeno mixture. Saute for a few seconds then add all to pot.





Remembering John Owen

In the last few years, John volunteered as part of a safety and de-escalation team during the uprising in Louisville, assuring people had safe passage aboard TARC and pedestrian safety was prioritized during tumultuous events. He also ran his own fundraiser campaigns for Juneteenth and Louisville Pride, recruiting supporters and meeting folks where they are at. He also provided counsel to former RPA Kentucky Council Representative Ron Schneider and Current Representative Josh Inzer.

John also worked tirelessly to advocate for better representation for minority groups in Kentucky, providing them assistance in registering to vote, means of contact for local elected officials, and education on local transit issues. During our last Rail Nation DC event, John hosted an after hours hospitality suite, offering a full spread of burgoo, fried chicken, beer cheese, and bourbon. Many in attendance will remember this last event where John ever colorful and ever boisterous – opened his doors to all with love, support, and his vast anecdotal history of the Association. We hope that we can serve his memory in our advocacy and treat others with the open-hearted compassion of this brave, passionate advocate.

The Sisters of Mercy of the Americas Kentucky historical highway marker dedication September 24, 2022 at Good Shepherd

The Sisters of Mercy of the Americas celebrated the 150th anniversary of their arrival in Louisville with a liturgy and reception in 2019 at Good Shepherd Church in Portland, a neighborhood in northwestern Louisivlle. Their legacy of service will be an official part of Kentucky history when the historical marker was dedicated at the same location on September 24, 2022.

Their history in the area began October 2, 1869, when, at the suggestion of Bishop William George McCloskey, Sister of Mercy from St. Louis arrived in the Portland area of Louisville to take over the operation of the U.S. Marine Hospital. The nursing skills of women religious had become legendary during the Civil War, so it was natural to seek a community of sisters to run the hospital. Under a five-year contract with the federal government, the sisters operated every aspect of the hospital, including direct care for those wounded in the Civil War and in the building of the Portland Canal, as well as lifetime boatmen who were sick or aged.

From the beginning, the Sisters also held Sunday school for children and for adults seeking instruction in the Catholic faith. In addition, on Saturdays, they offered sewing and needlework classes for girls. The sisters also started visitation in the area to comfort and assist the poor, sick and elderly. Within a year, they had begun to offer education to hospital patients and other adults in the area. Since hospitals didn't pay much in those days, the sisters bought a cow and put in a garden to feed themselves and reduce expenses.





A crowd of about 50 special guests witnessed the dedication - including one Sisters of Mercy HS alumna who graduated more than 70 years ago!



Irish Shades and Banshees in Portland



Recipes from the Ladies of Baptist Tabernacle

Autumn is here and that means cooler weather is on it way. And, that means the palate will soon crave a nourishing bowl of soup. Here are a few choices to make you hungry with a few more recipes to make you want to put on a apron and make a delicious mess in the kitchen. Enjoy!

Potato Soup

16 oz. Frozen hash browns1 cup celery, chopped

1 can chicken broth

2 cups milk

2 cups water

1 can cream of chicken soup

1 cup onions, chopped

Add hash browns, chicken broth, water, onions, and celery to medium saucepan, cook over low heat for about 45 minutes. Mix soup and milk together and add to potato mixture and cook about 15 more minutes. Salt and pepper to taste. If you really, really want to, you can toss a handful of shredded cheese on top of your bowl of soup.

Pitch In

1 lb. Hamburger
1 can tomato sauce
½ cup chopped onions
1 can dices tomatoes
½ cup chopped celery
with basil, garlic, and oregano
1 can sliced carrots
1 cup water
1 can whole potatoes, sliced
1 can whole kernel corn

Brown hamburger, onions, and celery. Drain grease. Place in a dutch oven or large sauce pan. Add remaining ingredients. Add salt and pepper to taste. Bring to boil, reduce heat and let simmer 15 more minutes.

Remember: All soups taste better when served with cornbread. That goes for chili, too.



Did someone say Chili!

1 lb. Hamburger
1 can diced tomatoes
1 lb. Sausage
1 can tomato sauce
½ onion, chopped
1 can whole kernel corn, drained
1 can chili hot beans, drained
1 Tbs. Chili powder
1 can red kidney beans, drained
1 Tbs. Garlic powder

Brown hamburger and sausage, drain. Place in dutch oven or large sauce pan. Add remaining ingredients. If chili looks too thick add a little water. Cook on medium heat until you can't resist the temptation to fill your bowl. Add shredded cheddar cheese, if you like. I won't tell anybody.

I forgot the corn bread recipe!!

Buy a box of Jiffy Corn muffin mix and follow the directions. Buy two boxes, you will want to make more.



Apple Crisp

5-6 cups peeled, cored, and sliced apples ³/₄ cups quick rolled oats ³/₄ cups brown sugar

³/₄ cups brown sugar

½ cup flour

½ tsp cinnamon

1 stick of butter or margarine

Place apples in greased pan. Combine oats, sugar, flour and cinnamon. But in butter/marg. Sprinkle mixture over apples. Bake 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Serve warn with whipped topping or ice cream.



Sweet Potato Fritters

(Disclaimer: I have not tried this recipe, but next stop at the grocers I am picking up some sweet potatoes and getting busy.)

1 lb. Sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into ½ inch pieces

1 egg

1 cup flour

2 Tbs brown sugar 2/3 cup cornmeal

2 Tbs butter

2 tsp baking powder

salt to taste

Oven at 375 degrees. Cook sweet potatoes in enough boiling water to cover for 15 minutes. Drain and cool. Mash potatoes. Add egg, brown sugar and butter. Mix well. Incorporate flour, cornmeal, and baking powder. Mix until well blended. Chill for 30 minutes. The mixture will be less sticky. Form into patties using ½ measuring cup. Place on a baking sheet that has been sprayed with baking oil. Bake for 20 minutes. For a little extra serve with Dipping Sauce below.

Dipping Sauce

1 six oz. Plain yogurt Dash of garlic powder 1 Tbs Chives Sprinkle of pepper 1 Tbsp. paprika

Combine ingredients. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

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Do You Have Diabetes?

Mark your calendar for November 14^{th} – World Diabetes Day! Diabetes is a health condition that is becoming more and more common. You probably know someone with Diabetes – or you might even have it yourself.

What is Diabetes?

Acids in your stomach break down the foods you eat into different nutrients. One of these nutrients is sugar, also called *glucose*. Glucose travels from your stomach into your bloodstream, which carries it to all the cells in your body that use glucose for energy to do their work – such as pumping your heart, blinking your eyelids, moving your arms and legs, and almost everything else your body does. Your *pancreas* (a small organ behind your stomach) produces a hormone called *insulin*. Insulin is very important because it helps move the glucose from the bloodstream into the cells that need it.

In diabetics, there is a problem with the insulin – either the body doesn't make enough of it or it is made but doesn't work well. Without insulin, the glucose the stomach is sending into the bloodstream can't be moved into the cells, so it builds up in the blood. When the level of glucose in the blood is too high, the body can't work properly. Diabetes can lead to blindness, heart disease, stroke, kidney failure, and amputations. About 210,000 people die from Diabetes every year.

Many complications of Diabetes can be prevented if your blood glucose level is controlled by eating right, exercising, and using medications. But sometimes changing your eating habits, increasing your physical activity, and learning how to use medications can be hard or confusing. The classes below can help you! Call today to sign up.
