Legacy Funeral Center - Schoppenhorst Chapel Serving the Portland Neighborhood for 129 Years

In 1892, three Dutch brothers owned and operated Schoppenhorst Brothers Laundry and Linen Service in the West End of Louisville. The youngest Schoppenhorst brother, Edward, became interested in the "Undertaking" business, so in 1892 he branched out and established his own funeral home, which became Schoppenhorst Brothers Funeral Home.

Schoppenhorst Brothers Funeral Home located their business in the beautiful historic 1865 residence built by Captain Kawien, an Ohio Riverboat captain. The funeral home began to flourish as community members noticed the compassion and genuine care Edward and his wife, Flora, served to the neighborhood.

This notable landmark of West Louisville is now listed in the National Register of Historic Places by the Department of Interior. The home features the original stained glass door made in France and shipped to Louisville in the 1860s. This beautiful eleven-foot vintage door showcases a piece of glass from every country in Europe and was handcrafted into a remarkable design.

The Scott Family of Jeffersonville, Indiana, purchased the historic Neurath & Schoppenhorst Funeral Home in 2017. The owners and operators of Scott

Since acquiring Schoppenhorst Chapel, the Scott Family has renovated the service chapel, the reception area, and glassed-in the back entryway. We are excited to continue to restore this National Historic Landmark, which has been a fixture of the Portland Neighborhood since 1892.

The Scott Family has been in the funeral industry since 1930 and owns many locations in Kentuckiana. Some funeral homes include Legacy Funeral Centers, Nunnelley Chapel and Schoppenhorst Chapel of Louisville, Kentucky, Scott Funeral Home, Legacy Funeral Center, and Faithful Companions Pet Cremation Services of Jeffersonville, Indiana.

The Scott Family proudly stands behind its reputation and will continue to serve the communities with the values instilled by our predecessors. If you have any questions, want information on preplanning your funeral, or would like to take a tour of our historic building, please reach out to Schoppenhorst Chapel. We are not only honored but grateful to serve our communities.

FEMA began accepting applications for Funeral Assistance on Monday, April 12, 2021 through a dedicated call center.

> COVID-19 Funeral Assistance Line Taking applications now 844-684-6333

Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Central Time

If your loved one has passed away since January 20, 2020 from COVID-19 or COVID-19 like symptoms you can be reimbursed for the funeral services. Most notably, FEMA shared that the maximum financial assistance will now be \$9,000 per funeral.

You will have to provide:

1. A copy of the death certificate. The death certificate must indicate the death "may have been caused by" or "was likely a result of" COVID-19 or COVID-19 like symptoms. Similar phrases that indicate a high likelihood of COVID-19 are also considered sufficient.

2. Proof of funeral expenses incurred. Documentation (receipts, funeral home contract, etc.) must include the applicant's name as responsible person for the expense, the deceased person's name, the amount of the funeral expenses.

If applicants already received reimbursement for certain funeral expenses through government agencies, voluntary agencies, non-profits, preneed insurance, or a funeral trust, you cannot resubmit those same expenses for reimbursement through this FEMA administered program.


If applicants received any outside assistance, they must include in documentation of this assistance in their application.

If you received financial assistance through the deceased life insurance policy, you may apply for reimbursement.

FEMA will award COVID-19 Funeral Assistance for a deceased person on a single application. (Do not submit multiple applications for same individual). If more than one person paid for funeral service they should register under a single application as applicant and co-applicant.

Louisville Grows Offering Low-Cost Seeds & Starts for Fall planting

2 days only – Saturday August 28 and Saturday September 11 10 am – 4 pm at Louisville Grows Green House, 1639 Portland Ave

Louisville Grows has become a powerful vehicle for community empowerment and a stronger local food system.

Their **Urban Agriculture Program** serves to support community gardens in areas of the city that experience food insecurity due to a lack of neighborhood supermarkets.

To help support that program, *Louisville Grows* produces a now-seasonal (twiceyearly, Spring and now Fall) *Seeds & Starts* Sale, offering locally grown, lowcost, heirloom vegetables, pollinators, fruit trees, berry bushes, container varieties, soil, compost, and more; all produced specifically for an urban environment.


In person sale dates are **Saturday**, **August 28 and Sept. 11, 10am-4pm** at Louisville Grows Green House, **1639 Portland Ave**.

In July, in *Louisville Grows*' new state-of-the-art Green House, Citizen Foresters and other volunteers started *planting seeds and potting starts* for the sale. "We're fast-approaching Fall planting time" says says *Louisville Grows*' Executive Director Ked Stanfield. "*Cole crops* like beets, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, collards, kale, lettuce, mustard, onion, radishes and turnips all need to go in the ground in early Fall for late Fall harvest," Each variety is chosen for its adaptability, biodiversity, beauty, and taste.

Proceeds from *Seeds & Starts* sales benefit Louisville Grows' Urban Agricultural program and its Community Garden Grants.

The grants provide selected applicants with technical assistance, education, increased revenue and infrastructure support. *Louisville Grows* awarded Community Garden grants to 10 Louisville Community Gardens in 2021 (details available upon request).

Children' Fine Art Classes with Louisville Visual Art Return to Portland Elementary and Western Middle School for the Arts

Louisville Visual Art's (LVA) Children's Fine Art Classes (CFAC) serve the neighborhood at Portland Elementary and Western Middle School for the Arts again this fall. Started in 1925, CFAC continues to nurture young artists with exceptional after-school art education in Portland and throughout Greater The CFAC curriculum Louisville. provides instruction in drawing, painting. and mixed-media art techniques alongside introductions to critique, art history, and aesthetics. Since every student is recommended by a professional educator or community leader, each group is motivated and focused on learning art.

Anita Fisher leads the CFAC at Portland Elementary; Amanda Thompson heads the class at Western Middle School. Highly qualified, both instructors also teach art during the regular school day at their respective schools, and have long experience in LVA's education programs.



As is the rule among CFAC teachers, Anita's and Amanda's enthusiasm for after school art with LVA remains high year after year.

The Portland CFACs meet after school for 8 two-hour sessions this fall. At the close of the school year in late spring / early summer, every CFAC student participates in an annual exhibit and sale of artwork they've made in the program. This public event happens right in Portland at LVA Gallery, 1538 Lytle Street, and is often a student's first opportunity to display their creative efforts in a professional exhibition. Since the work is for sale, some aspiring young artists also get the satisfaction of selling a drawing, painting, or print to a collector outside their own family.

Along with increased knowledge of visual culture and mastery of art-making techniques, CFAC students gain valuable transferable skills. Christina, a CFAC student at Butler High School, says, "In [CFAC], you learn a lot of things, such as color, form, shape, and movement, and . . . I can translate those into creative writing." Christina is also one of the many students who report feeling more socially confident after bonding with CFAC peers who share a love of visual art.


